75% of students reported camp helped them focus on their future careers goals (e.g. the importance of doing well in school and going to college).

68% of students reported camp made them think more seriously about going to college.

75% of students reported after the camp experience they are more interested in pursuing a career in healthcare.

90% of students reported they were happy with their overall experience at camp.

Thanks to such a successful summer (which included adding four new camps), HealthForce MN continues to expand for summer 2016 and anticipate seeing 16 total Scrubs Camps in Minnesota. In addition, we will be working collaboratively with other Centers of Excellence to pilot a camp using the Scrubs Camp model called Camp Explore (which is a weeklong camp for high school students to explore careers in not just healthcare but also in engineering, manufacturing, IT, and agriculture.)
